Gale tries to schedule the room the first Friday of each month from noon to 3:15pm. However, the room is not always available on that day or she may have a conflict in her schedule, so flexibility is key. The next paint day is April 7rd from noon to **3:15pm**. The group which sometimes includes Danny Phillips, Jane Morgan, Kara Gardner and others, has been meeting for 15 months.

The large room, which is free to register, is described by Kara as "spectacular." It includes floor to ceiling south facing windows (pictured with Jane Morgan). The kitchen sink may be used by water based medium artists (not oil based) to clean their brushes. There are artists using pencil, charcoal, pastels, acrylic and oil paints. The library even provided Gale a dozen plastic table cloths to keep the space clean. The group is mindful of the environment and careful how the space is left, hence cleaning oil brushes at home. You can see the range of art she creates at her website **Aztridmoan.com**. She most often paints in acrylic and watercolor, specializes in screen and relief printing, and incorporates other mediums such as clay in her creations.

When it was mentioned to Madeline Dillner that our guest artist was college student, Aztrid Moan, Madeline said she has been "following Aztrid on Instagram for years". That is quite a compliment for a young artist, to have established herself so early in life as a professional artist with not only a website, but Facebook, Twitter and Instagram accounts to promote her art. Aztrid has exhibited her work at galleries in the area such as Gallery 1 Paseo, Oklahoma Visual Arts Coalition, Paseo Arts Association, Studio Six, and is represented by JRB Art at the Elms, Factory Obscura, and Carpe Artem.

Art is in her blood. Her family consists of 3 generations of artists. Astrid often collaborates with other artists, including her mother Nicole Moan who is MDAG's guest artist May 1st. Nicole is known for her ceramic corsets and Aztrid for printing designs on some of the fabrics. The mother daughter duo currently have an exhibit at Penn Square Mall. And you may have seen their creations modeled at the OKC MOA Fashion Show this past February 9th. Truly a fascinating event.

We have the opportunity to see Aztrid's printmaking in person and give it a try. For a preview, there is a video on her website where she demonstrates a printing process similar to what she will demo for MDAG on April 3rd. Aztrid is going to design a fox, cut the pattern, and print the fox design on a scarf.

Those of us who sign up at the meeting can print their own design on a scarf provided with the workshop. Additional scarves (some dyed different colors) will be available for purchase for \$10 each at the workshop or you can bring your own scarves. The workshop will be held Saturday, April 8, from 9am to 3pm at "Hideout Art", located at 911 West Britton Road, OKC, which is just east of Western Ave. Bring your lunch.

The level of detail possible in relief printing is eye-catching. The process starts with a drawing on linoleum or Nonfiberglass Reinforced Plastic (NRP) which Aztrid will also provide. Be thinking of a special fashion design that will uniquely showcase you or someone you love. Remember, you cut away the negative space. If you have wood carving tools, bring those, if not, Aztrid has some we can share. The workshop will cost \$30 per person with a maximum of 15 participants. You can even print her blocks if you want. Library auditorium to see and hear Bostick's stories. That is a huge jump from a few months ago, the best crowd yet by far.

"Thank You Al." Bostick started off leading the audience in a little heart pumping exercise after which he interpreted the meaning of the African gestures. "With my mind I welcome you, with my word I welcome you and with my heart I welcome you." And he ended with "there is nothing up my sleeves." Bostick told many stories from his childhood in New Orleans, black history especially as it was tied to art, his teaching experiences, and merged it together into the painting he demonstrated. It worked really well seeing the close-up view of Bostick's painting on the big screen, while Bostick was able to face the audience and make eve contact.

As a young child, there was always paper in his house and he was expected to draw. There was never an excuse of being bored or a reason to be inactive. His extended family and friends spent long hours under a tree in their front yard playing checkers, with him absorbing the pride of his heritage, at his elders' feet. Bostick has spent his

life sharing with others, including his students, the strong pride of his African roots. Among the stories, Bostick told of enslaved African women who hung quilts on the clothesline with maps in the quilt's design to help escaping slaves along the Underground Rail Road. And some women also braided their hair in ways to point the way. Both were forms of art that served a social purpose.

Bostick prepared his canvas in advance with a drawing of African faces, masks, and other symbols drawn in pencil and hot glue. The hot glue, he said, adheres well to the canvas. adds texture, and allows him to apply a mostly thin layer of brightly colored acrylic paints to the entire background. He was then able to use the dried hot glue lines and visible pencil lines to paint the figures and symbols without referring to the original study. Although he starts out with an idea or plan, he lets the design evolve.

Bostick talked about the different skin tones in the black community ranging from light to blue black and showing undertones of yellow, red, blue, even purple. He asked the audience to guess what undertone his skin was and several people correctly said red. His portraits are mostly dark silhouettes with intentionally brightly colored details to add contrast. He called the colors

he used "Jewel Tones of Africa" and selects combinations that will "pop." The acrylic paints help seal the glue. Additionally, Bostick finishes his painting with Krylon varnish because he "likes the sheen."

Bostick has a saying that "Art is (can be) an irritation in the same way sand is an irritation to an oyster." We each can use art as a successful tool in sharing the harsh realities of social injustice and the harmful results of Climate Change by applying Bostick's passion to make the world a more beautiful pearl for everyone. Even if it takes irritating a few oysters

ART ADVENTURE IN ITALY

The Oklahoma Art Guild (OAG) included an invitation to join a trip to Italy in their latest newsletter. I was intrigued and within three days got my flights and registration to attend this exciting opportunity. **Darla Bostick** who is the artist in charge of the event told me she had been a member of the OAG for a national art show and is now leading art trips around the world. She has been to over 75 countries. The Italy trip she is leading next is **May 3 thru May 13, 2023 for 10 days** in the Umbrian Region, a 2 hour drive north of Rome. Participants stay at picturesque "La Romita" which was a monastery built in 1548!

Darla's Art Adventures are attended by a group of artists (and interested non-artists) who love to travel. They gather photographs, sketches, paint and make an art journal of the trip. On site, we will do some quick sketches or painting but primarily use our time to see the area, using our cameras to gather images. Each day there is a fun challenge for photography as well as the journal itself. There are also lessons dedicated to various techniques. After returning "home" to La Romita each day, there'll be time for instruction and creating! Breakfast, lunch, and dinner will be provided except the few days we may be sightseeing at lunch time. One or two people to a room and the bathroom is at the end of the hall. The weather was beautiful when they were in Rome last May and the poppies should be in bloom. The bus picks us up at the at the airport 10:30 am on May 3rd which means you need to leave OKC by May 2nd. The bus will take us back to the airport to catch flights after 10:00 on May 13 and the bus will take us to little villages in the region to draw, paint and sightsee. We have to be able to walk a mile over cobblestones and rough ground and handle our own luggage. This is the trip to finally learn to pack light.

I won't have Bill to carry my luggage. He will be at the MDAG meeting May 1st helping members hang their environmental art at 3pm and setting up for the zoom demo by artist Nicole Moan at 6:30 pm.

The art workshop, accommodations and meals (with wine) **cost \$3,750**. Since I am going by myself, I will tag along with Darla and her husband Gary Bostick, and drive to Denton, TX to meet them. We are leaving a day early in case there are any delays and will stay in a hotel May 2. The roundtrip flight (American Airlines AA240) from DFW to Leonardo da Vinci Fiumicino airport (FCO) leaved DFW at 2:41pm on May 1. The return flight (American Airlines AA239) leaves Rome (FCO) at 10 am and cost me **\$2,031**. I guess the flights are the same on other days but don't know that. It is a direct flight both ways on those flights and under 12 hours.

La Romita has been hosting these art retreats for over 50 years. So, if you can't make it now, there will be other opportunities. They have different artists who lead the adventure. You can contact Darla for details: www//darlabostick.com and learn more about La Romita and other available dates at https://laromita.org. It appears they even offer retreats for writers. This trip sounded like the ideal trip to go by myself because many attending are artists and will likely be friendly to other artists. Plus, I talked to both Darla and Gary for an hour each and they were very helpful. Plus, some of you may go, so more friendly faces.
