## What is Your Painting Style?

You've been told you have to write an artist statement and describe your painting style. Is it time to panic? You ask yourself, "Am I considered a realistic painter, abstract artist, impressionist, or what?" You could ask an art teacher

who knows your work what she thinks. Or, consider the options.

Your art style has evolved over time so it is not set in stone. You allowed yourself to be open to new influences. You experimented with different styles and mediums.

Different art styles can be associated with different media. For example, water-color tends to be associated with a softer, more impressionistic style, while acrylics may be used for a bolder, more abstract approach.

Look at the body of the work you will be exhibiting and identify any common elements or themes. Identifying patterns in your art may point to a particular style. What is your style today or what is your style being shown?

Contemporary art typically refers to art created after World War II and is characterized by a focus on conceptual ideas and experimentation with new materials and techniques. Contemporary artists often push boundaries and challenge traditional art forms. If your work is experimental, conceptual,

program starts at 6:30 pm at the Midwest City Library. **Moan works in custom clay and is most famous for her one-of-a-kind wearable ceramic corsets, suitable for black tie functions**. Her father was a clay sculptor and always allowed her a slab of clay to work with by his side. Although she started drawing corsets at the young age of seven, she felt her later fabric designs looked like everybody else's. That would not do for Moan, who always strives to be her true, unique self as evident in her advice, "Learn what you can from others but take everything you learn to make something new and different."

Moan's first ceramic corset, made in 2000, was inspired by her need for a unique outfit to wear to a fetish art show. Her corsets start as a slab of rolled clay, cut into three to ten pieces. Each custom sized piece is shaped on custom body molds to accommodate male and female bodies, including plus-sizes. The clay's surface is carved, stamped. pressed, or adorned, oftentimes with hand-made flowers like the roses Moan will demonstrate for MDAG. After kiln firing, brilliant-colored glazes are applied and the corsets are fired a second time. Ribbon is laced between the sections, which makes the custom-made corsets not only adjustable to fit better when purchased but they can be adjusted to better conform to the wearer's aging body to make the fashion investments last longer! Buy a custom display stand and the wearable art can also adorn the wearer's home!

Moan was the first American artist to be accepted to London's Swatch Alternative Fashion Week. Since then, she and her entourage of corseted models have graced runways, exhibitions, and print and video publications across the country and around the world. Don't miss seeing the PBS series Gallery America to find "The Fashionable Art of Nicole Moan." Especially impressive is seeing the many professional photographs taken of her modeled creations, posed among imaginative and exotic staging. No wonder Moan says photographers are her best friends. At one fashion shoot there were 300 photographers excitedly capturing her corseted models. According to Moan, most of her corsets are purchased for photo shoots and her corsets have been featured in a few movies and music videos.

In addition to the corsets, Moan creates jewelry, and high relief tiles and ceramic murals. She can make an entire room an art piece. In fact, she can show prospective clients her Midtown home, her life-sized portfolio, which includes an entire bathroom, living room floor, and countertops of her high relief tiles and murals. You could start on a smaller scale and commission Moan to create the kitchen backsplash for your home remodel.

Moan didn't always want to be an artist. She took classes in auto mechanics, engineering, marketing and welding to divert her career path from that of her artist parents. Many artists in the guild will agree it is not easy to make a living in art. And creating a unique style requires persistence, despite the sometimes-discouraging advice offered by others. As Moan has observed, "Innovation comes from failure and the failure to quit." But, being an artist is a calling that is hard to resist.



The carving tools (wood or linoleum), Speedball ink, and rollers are relatively inexpensive and can be purchased locally or online.

An artist doesn't need to carve on wood or other heavy board. The shortage of building materials during Covid resulted in Nicole Moan finding and suggesting Aztrid try a lightweight and 100% waterproof "Wall Panel" plastic product. Turns out is can be easily carved.

A 4x8 foot sheet that is used in showers and sold at Lowe's only cost \$20 to \$25. The Moans use an exacto knife to cut the sheet in half in the Lowe's parking in order to fit the pieces in their car.

The panel can not be stored on it's end or allowed to flop around in the wind so it needs to be kept flat.

The ink is smoothed out with the roller and then rolled onto the carved piece. Be sure the ink is not "watery." The ironed fabric is laid flat, inked panel is laid on it and pressed down.

Aztrid uses a glass mushroom looking object that was gifted to her from a teacher which works well. She has also used a baker's rolling pin. Whatever object is used needs to be able to be pressed smoothly over the entire design or some parts will not be evenly inked. Before the ink dries on the pattern, the plastic can be soaked in warm dish-soap water and a toothbrush used to clean out the cuts.

The pattern can be used over and over but may occasionally need to be cleaned out with the carving tools. If incorporating words in the design, be sure to reverse them using reversing software or retrace the words from the backside (you can see through on thin paper).

If you want parts of the design to be different colors, ink those separately. You may even cut the pattern apart to more easily ink different colors.

Aztrid made several very attractive fox designs for the demonstration. The slinky long fox was especially foxy looking. Highlights on the fox's hair and the background was carved away so the fox was mostly inked. The outlines of other foxes' faces were carved out on both sides of the lines so the raised lines received the ink. The demo pieces were carved very quickly. Although the ink is water based, once dried fabric can be washed.

Nicole was wearing one of Aztrid's printed t-shirts printed

in two colors that had been washed without a problem. Those who signed up for Aztrid's workshop were looking forward to printing her fox, koi, and other designs as well as their own.

You can take printing classes at the Untitled Art Space which is located near the YMCA downtown at 1 NE 3<sup>rd</sup> Street. That is where the Steamroller Print Festival will occur April 22, 2023, from 10 am to 6pm. Say "hello" to Aztrid at the festival.


